IN THE SPOT LIGHT

Some time ago I picked up a yellow card at the CSO regarding the first tradition of our fellowship. "Our common welfare should come first. Personal recovery is dependent upon AA unity." As the steps help the individual to recovery from a seemingly hopeless state of mind and body, the traditions form a set of guidelines that hold the fellowship together. From the card:

"It is hoped that our common suffering as alcoholics and our common solution in AA will transcend most issues and curtail negative behaviors that could jeopardize the safety of anyone attending an AA meeting. Nevertheless, Alcoholics Anonymous is a microcosm of the larger society we exist in . As such, problems found in the outside world can also make their way into the rooms of AA. For this reason, groups and

members discuss the topic of safety- to raise awareness in the fellowship and to seek through sponsorship, workshops, and meetings, to create as safe an environment as possible to carry AA's message of hope and recovery to the still suffering alcoholic."

The adage that exists regarding if the newcomer is driven away from AA by some part of the program or behavior in meetings, that John Barleycorn will drive them back is no longer acceptable. I know that my own behavior in this regard has driven me to renew my introspection and write of my fear inventory and to speak to those I consider to be the closed mouth friend about my feelings as well as in my home group. Long term sobriety makes it even more important that we do our very best to act as examples of a positive effect from working steps.

There is a meeting every Monday at the Pueblo county jail for male inmates, you must be cleared by the sheriffs office to attend. Please have one year or more of continuous sobriety before volunteering. It would probably be best if you were all the way off of your paper, fully released from the justice system, before applying.
