## My Essential Spiritual Tool Kit Patty B - Pueblo

"When therefore, we were approached by those whom the problem has been solved, there was nothing left for us but to pick up the spiritual tools laid at our feet. " (Page 25, Chapter 2, There's a Solution, Big Book Alcoholics Anonymous)

When I made my foray into AA meetings and was told that I could drink again, but I didn't "have" to drink again, I was a bit skeptical. I was also told there is a solution, and we can show you how if you're honest, open and willing. If was honest with myself and having admitted to my innermost self that I was an alcoholic; I was willing to go to any lengths to stay sober because I was desperate. However, being open-minded to a higher power was difficult. I felt let down, disappointed and disillusioned with my experiences of a higher power, let alone spiritual tools prior to walking into AA.

Recently, celebrating 25 years of sobriety, I was asked multiple times how I got sober and have maintained sobriety for so long. I've experienced great joys and very tragic circumstances over the years. I knew that no matter what I couldn't drink and that a drink would only diminish joy or make a tragedy much worse.

The answer to my long-term sobriety was simple yet complex. My mind and heart always return to the spiritual tools laid at my feet. I can't say which one or ones of these spiritual tools or the combination of them kept me sober. All of them have been essential at different times.

The purpose of this article is to highlight the tools that contributed in whole or in part to my sobriety. It's my hope that any or many of these may help you, too.

### **My Essential Spiritual Tools**

- 1. Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous and The Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions studying/working the steps as a design for living, using the steps for all situations.
- 2. A Sponsor/Sponsoring Asking and accepting help and guidance, carrying the message, giving to another recovering alcoholic what was freely given to me, ensuring against a slip, a sense of duty, gives my sobriety and experiences meaning in benefitting others
- 3. **Higher Power of my Understanding** Always changing and expanding, experiencing in my life, accepting that mine and your Higher Power are our own business
- 4. The Fellowship We are not a glum lot having fun in sobriety, Don't ever have to do this alone, the power of we my tribe, at home anywhere I go in AA meetings, events, conferences, at ease whenever I go with other AA members to non-AA events, can contact anyone on phone lists and they will listen, be supportive.
- 5. **Meetings** Fellowship in person or online, place to learn, share and grow, feel, safe, loved, part of those in recovery
- 6. Service Work Inside and outside the rooms see how I can contribute, Get out of my head and extend kindness, a million ways at meetings, part of the service structure: treatment, corrections, public information, archives, conferences, assemblies, Central Service Office, District, Area, General Service Office, Showing up for others locally celebrating accomplishments, supporting them during loss or other difficult situations, helping when people are sick or need to move.
- 7. Expressing Gratitude Journaling, showing up for others, smiling
- 8. Carrying the Message Reaching out to newcomers at meetings, reaching out to recovery friends who you know are struggling, bridging the gap: acting as a temporary contact for those getting out of treatment and taking or going to a meeting together, Twelve Step Calls putting your name on a contact list and being available when someone reaches out for the hand of AA to listen or sit with them, responding to texts, phone calls to those who reach out to you, practicing these principles in all our affairs
- 9. **Prayer and Meditation** Prayers for help, gratitude, epiphanies, comfort for others, praying for two weeks, meditating alone, in groups and guiding groups, being guided, finding my high power within.
